Course Description (300 character limit): The History of Islam course will study the development and spread of Islam from its formation to the current era. The class will explore the breadth of Islam throughout the world and its influence in different regions, and how those regions influenced Islam; specifically, Islam within different cultural and societal contexts in history.

4. The student will be introduced to Islamic literature as a basis for historic interpretation to aid the student in the understanding of Islamic societies using critical thinking.
