Aside from loans that are actually certified and disbursed by the financial aid office, we don't receive or otherwise maintain records of any data on private loan debt. The following table shows the number of students awarded financial aid and the number receiving federal student loans on an annual basis going back to the 2003-04 award year. What is most notable is the percentage of students borrowing from both subsidized and unsubsidized loan programs; that figure dropped significantly in 2013-14 as a result of college efforts to better inform students about unsubsidized loans and overall borrowing, and has continued to drop each year since then.

7. Please provide information about all alternate proposals presented by the faculty association.

The Office of Academic and Student Affairs has met with faculty and deans to discuss and review all alternate proposals presented by the faculty association. Following are the administrative recommendations.

The Respiratory Therapy program will remain on the program reduction list due to low enrollment and limited job openings. One 1.0 faculty position will be eliminated. One 1.0 faculty position will be reassigned to other Health Professions courses for which they are certified.

A proposal to create a reimagined Health and Wellness Center for the college will require significant additional analysis and detailed budget review. The recommendation to eliminate a 1.0 and .8 FTE counseling faculty position remains on the administrative balancing proposal. Impacted faculty are certified to teach Human Services courses and have rights to available part time counseling assignments in TRIO and Florence.

GIS will be suspended for one year to allow the lead faculty member to complete an academic program review that will include a plan to increase enrollment in all classes. For students who are enrolled in Watershed Science and need a required GIS course to finish, a teach-out plan next year will be developed that may include course work and/or independent study next year.

The Early Childhood Education Program budget will be reduced by \$135,000. The program will be retained and reorganized to reduce the total credits required to earn a degree, including a reduction in practicum courses and reduction of a faculty FTE. The total program budget will be \$272,500. A reorganization plan will be completed by June 17, 2017.

The recommendation to eliminate Religion and Philosophy disciplines due to a large diversity of social science offerings for students to choose from for degree requirements remains in the administrative balancing proposal. One 1.0 FTE faculty position will be eliminated. A limited number of Philosophy classes will continue to be offered (less than .5 FTE): PHL 221, Critical Thinking; and PHL 201, Ethics. Five sections total in PHL will be offered next year. Three sections of Critical Thinking will be offered, one each term. Two sections of Ethics will be offered, once in fall and once in winter.

8. Was Burning Glass reviewed for Respiratory Therapy Jobs data?

The data source the college has used historically for job projections is the OED, QualityInfo.org. web site. In addition to using employment projections from this website as a criteria for the budget development process, this data is used by faculty to annually update career and technical programs information in the college catalog descriptions. Job projections are one of a set of criteria used when reviewing budget reduction decisions.

The college performed a refined search on Burning Glass using "Respiratory Therapist" and Lane County and an "Associate's Degree" and came up with 22 postings available in the last year (5/1/16-4/30/17).

Oregon Employment Department (OED): Respiratory Therapists (291126) all OR counties:

States that there are 18 current job openings listed in the state, but not all are full time jobs; some are oncall or per diem and only two are local (Peace Health-Springfield: one position is listed as "per diem" i.e., working on a day to day basis and the other is a night shift 12 hour position). Job openings from other websites indicate 25 openings. OED indicates that these links are provided as supplemental resources. The Employment Department cannot validate these openings nor endorse any of these external sites. Some of these jobs may no longer be open. In some cases, a single opening may be posted on multiple sites.

9. Is it possible to increase the online course fee and use that revenue to offset additional online related costs?

The current proposal for FY18 is to create a \$25 per online course fee. Of the \$325,000 estimated revenue based on projected enrollment, \$93,100 would cover a new instructional design position to support online course development. This leaves \$231,900 for new investments in online course development work and support resources.

The proposed online course fee is intended to support development and expansion of quality online instruction at Lane (rather than covering existing administrative costs), thereby increasing access, enrollment and student success. The administration does not recommend a fee above \$25 per course at this time as we do not want to price Lane's online courses uncompetitively.

10. Is it possible to create a general student fee that all credit students would pay to support specific lowenrolled programs?

It would be unusual to create a fee for *all* students to subsidize specific academic programs. As programs evolved and costs escalated, the fee would need to be increased or adjusted. The clearest and most transparent mechanism for student support of Lane academic programs is through tuition.

11. Please provide counseling demand and availability.

The Counseling and Advising Center faculty primarily use a drop-in process for counseling. Counselors respond to students in the order they check in. Some students are offered appointments for follow up visits or on-going counseling.

We currently have 6 of 9 counselors (excluding interns) providing an average 20 hours of counseling time (drop-in and appointments) scheduled daily, serving an average of 13 students per day (approximately 55% are for personal counseling, the remaining include ABSE Guided Studies academic counseling).

The other 3 counseling positions are assigned to specific programs (Drug and Alcohol Prevention, Center for Accessible Resources, and Women's Program.)
